
ABOUT KEYNOTE SPEAKER Majora Carter

MAJORA CARTER simultaneously addresses public health, poverty alleviation and climate change as one of the nation's pioneers in successful urban green-collar job training and placement systems.

Carter founded Sustainable South Bronx in 2001 to achieve environmental justice through economically sustainable projects informed by community needs. Her work has earned numerous awards including a MacArthur "Genius" Fellowship. She was named one of *Essence Magazine*'s 25 Most Influential African-Americans and one of the NY *Post*'s Most Influential NYC Women. A board member of the Wilderness Society, SJF and CERES, she also hosts *The Promised Land*, a National Public Radio series (thepromisedland.org).

As President of the Majora Carter Group, LLC, Carter advises cities, foundations, universities, businesses, and communities around the world on unlocking their green-collar economic potential to benefit everyone.

Early 1900's: Founding of intramural athletics, book exchange, career services, freshman handbook, freshman orientation

The APPLES Service Learning Program is a student-led program that builds sustainable, service-learning partnerships among students, faculty and communities in North Carolina and beyond. By engaging all partners in an enriched, community-based curriculum, APPLES experiential programs foster socially aware and civically involved students. APPLES was founded in 1990 by a small group of students led by Tony Deifell when they noticed a lack of connection between students' classroom learning and their service work in the community. These students had the idea to incorporate service-learning into Carolina academics, and out of their efforts the APPLES Service-learning Program was born. In 1991, APPLES offered its first six service-learning courses to the student body. Throughout the next few years, APPLES expanded the number of courses offered and added new programs, such as the Social Entrepreneur Fellowships and Summer Internships. Today, APPLES provides a range of diverse service-learning experiences that reach over 2,200 students, 135 faculty members, and 350 community partners each year.

The Student Coalition for Action in Literacy Education (SCALE) was founded in the fall of 1989 when two Carolina undergraduate tutors, Lisa Madry and Clay Thorp, joined together with the mission to mobilize and support college students who wanted to address the literacy needs of this country as a social justice issue. From its inception SCALE has been at the core of a robust network of campus-based literacy programs that fully involves students and their learners. Now a program in the School of Education, SCALE sponsors the Read. Write.Act.Virtual Conference, the only national conference specifically for campus-based literacy programs and their community partners, and promotes National Literacy Action Week. In addition to managing America Reads and the North Carolina LiteracyCorps, SCALE also offers a comprehensive resource library and a useful toolkit including training workshop agendas and on-line trainings, and provides technical assistance for programs around the country.
