But how do small businesses actually impact our communities? Is it really better to "shop small" instead of simply heading to the nearest big box retailer?








8 FOR EVERY \$100 SPENT

For every \$100 spent at locally owned stores, \$68 goes straight back to the community, compared to just \$43 when shopping at a large chain. This revenue comes back in the form of taxes. payroll and other expenses.2

MILLENNIALS IN THE WORKFORCE

Currently comprising 25% of the nation's workforce, this group is expected to account for 75% of the workforce by just 2025, an exponential increase in purchasing power for a socially-conscious set of shoppers.3
